Kodiak, Alaska — The crew of the Coast Guard Cutter ALEX HALEY returned to Kodiak on Thursday afternoon following a successful 85-day deployment, having patrolled more than 11,000 miles throughout the Gulf of Alaska and Bering Sea.

The "Bulldog of the Bering" departed from Kodiak in early August and sailed west as the Bering Sea cutter, responsible for safeguarding a \$13.9 billion fishing industry and enabling search and rescue coverage in an area spanning 890,000 square miles.

An invaluable asset in the nation's most challenging maritime environment, the cutter conducted domestic fisheries enforcement boardings, patrolled the United States-Russia Maritime Boundary Line, and provided a re-assuring presence to all seagoing vessels throughout the Bering during an unprecedented global pandemic. As the Bering Sea cutter, ALEX HALEY's primary mission was the enforcement of federal fisheries regulations for many valuable species, including Pacific cod, pollock, sole, and halibut. In addition, boarding teams conducted routine safety checks of each vessel boarded to ensure compliance with maritime safety law.

As summer gave way to fall, the focus shifted towards the highly visible red king crab fishing fleet of 'Deadliest Catch' fame, rounding out a patro in which 20 boardings were conducted for vessels participating in nearly 10 different fisheries.

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When not engaged directly in law enforcement boardings, the cutter spent time patrolling the Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) between the United States and Russia. This border separates the two nations' Exclusive Economic Zones, which under international law establishes natural resource claims, including fisheries. In conjunction with the Russian Border Guard, the ALEX HALEY's presence along the boundary line deters illegal fishing and promotes effective cooperation between Russian and American maritime forces. While operating along the MBL, they had a unique opportunity to cross the 180th parallel of longitude and initiate the crew into the "Realm of the Golden Dragon." The 180th meridian is the International Date Line, where West becomes East, and Sunday becomes Monday. The ALEX HALEY crew is part of an elite group of mariners that can claim the title of "Golden Dragon!"

In addition to patrolling the Maritime Boundary Line, ALEX HALEY joined the Japanese Maritime Self-Defense Force vessel KASHIMA for a high-latitude exercise in early September.

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With the Arctic regions and Bering Sea becoming increasingly important to national strategic interests, cooperation between the U.S. and maritime allies is crucial to American economic strength and security. While underway, ALEX HALEY remained focused on an intensive training regimen, with particular focus on navigation, damage control, helicopter operations, and watch qualifications.

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With over 30 new crewmembers arriving during a busy summer transfer season, the need for effective training was vital in keeping ALEX HALEY operating safely and efficiently.



Crewmembers trained entitusiastically through an array of scenarios ranging from engine room fires to manoverboard recoveries, and proved the effectiveness of that training when responding to an actual engine room fire!

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Despite the pace of operations and multiple unanticipated changes to the schedule, ALEX HALEY crewmembers found some time to relax and enjoy the unique experiences that the Bering Sea has to offer. Whether panning for gold in Nome, chasing Dolly Varden trout and salmon in Dutch Harbor, flexing their artistic skills during paint night, hauling 100lb halibut out of the deep, or participating in an underway triathlon challenge, the crew managed to find plenty of morale opportunities throughout the Last Frontier!
